

## Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and SSI are Lifelines for South Carolina Residents with Disabilities

### *Lifelines for South Carolinians with Disabilities...*

Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) are lifelines for South Carolinians with disabilities, including people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and their families:

- Medicaid**
  - South Carolina's Medicaid program enrolls over 964,000 people including over 163,000 non-elderly adults and children with disabilities.<sup>1</sup>
  - Over 8,300 South Carolinians with I/DD receive Medicaid home and community-based (HCBS) services.<sup>2</sup>
- Medicare**
  - Medicare enrolls over 839,000 South Carolinians, including over 187,000 people with disabilities.<sup>3</sup>
- Social Security**
  - Social Security serves over 986,000 South Carolinians, including over 201,000 Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) beneficiaries, along with their spouses and dependent children.<sup>4</sup>
- SSI**
  - SSI serves over 116,000 low-income seniors and people with disabilities in South Carolina.<sup>4</sup>

### *...that Boost the South Carolina Economy*

**Medicaid and Medicare** bring federal dollars into South Carolina and help create jobs:

- Medicaid brought the state of South Carolina over \$3.4 billion in federal dollars in 2012.<sup>5</sup>
- Medicare spending in South Carolina was over \$7.2 billion in 2009.<sup>6</sup>

**Social Security and SSI** benefits are typically spent in-state and help boost the South Carolina economy:

- Social Security paid over \$13.4 billion in benefits to South Carolinians in 2013, including over \$2.7 billion in Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits.<sup>4</sup>
- SSI paid over \$690 million in federal benefits to South Carolinians in 2013.<sup>4</sup>
