

Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and SSI are Lifelines for Mississippi Residents with Disabilities

Lifelines for Mississippians with Disabilities...

Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) are lifelines for Mississippians with disabilities, including people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and their families:

- Medicaid**
 - Mississippi's Medicaid program enrolls over 781,000 people including over 170,000 non-elderly adults and children with disabilities.¹
 - Over 1,800 Mississippians with I/DD receive Medicaid home and community-based (HCBS) services.²
- Medicare**
 - Medicare enrolls over 525,000 Mississippians, including over 144,000 people with disabilities.³
- Social Security**
 - Social Security serves over 621,000 Mississippians, including over 152,000 Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) beneficiaries, along with their spouses and dependent children.⁴
- SSI**
 - SSI serves over 126,000 low-income seniors and people with disabilities in Mississippi.⁴

...that Boost the Mississippi Economy

Medicaid and Medicare bring federal dollars into Mississippi and help create jobs:

- Medicaid brought the state of Mississippi over \$3.3 billion in federal dollars in 2012.⁵
- Medicare spending in Mississippi was over \$5.2 billion in 2009.⁶

Social Security and SSI benefits are typically spent in-state and help boost the Mississippi economy:

- Social Security paid over \$7.8 billion in benefits to Mississippians in 2013, including over \$1.9 billion in Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits.⁴
- SSI paid over \$730 million in federal benefits to Mississippians in 2013.⁴
