



Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and SSI are Lifelines for New Mexico Residents with Disabilities

Lifelines for New Mexicans with Disabilities...

Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) are lifelines for New Mexicans with disabilities, including people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and their families:

Medicaid	•	New Mexico's Medicaid program enrolls over 576,000 people including over 67,000 non-elderly adults and children with disabilities. ¹ Over 4,100 New Mexicans with I/DD receive Medicaid home and community-based (HCBS) services. ²
Medicare	•	Medicare enrolls over 337,000 New Mexicans, including over 67,000 people with disabilities. $^{\rm 3}$
Social Security	•	Social Security serves over 382,000 New Mexicans, including over 70,000 Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) beneficiaries, along with their spouses and dependent children. ⁴
SSI	•	SSI serves over 63,000 low-income seniors and people with disabilities in New Mexico. $^{\rm 4}$

...that Boost the New Mexico Economy

Medicaid and Medicare bring federal dollars into New Mexico and help create jobs:

- Medicaid brought the state of New Mexico over \$2.4 billion in federal dollars in 2012.⁵
- Medicare spending in New Mexico was over \$2.4 billion in 2009.⁶

Social Security and SSI benefits are typically spent in-state and help boost the New Mexico economy:

- Social Security paid over \$4.8 billion in benefits to New Mexicans in 2013, including over \$920 million in Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits.⁴
- SSI paid over \$370 million in federal benefits to New Mexicans in 2013.⁴
