



Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and SSI are Lifelines for North Carolina Residents with Disabilities

Lifelines for North Carolinians with Disabilities...

Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) are lifelines for North Carolinians with disabilities, including people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and their families:

Medicaid	•	North Carolina's Medicaid program enrolls over 1,953,000 people including over 334,000 non-elderly adults and children with disabilities. ¹ Over 12,800 North Carolinians with I/DD receive Medicaid home and community-based (HCBS) services. ²
Medicare	•	Medicare enrolls over 1,602,000 North Carolinians, including over 351,000 people with disabilities. ³
Social Security	•	Social Security serves over 1,859,000 North Carolinians, including over 371,000 Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) beneficiaries, along with their spouses and dependent children. ⁴
SSI	•	SSI serves over 230,000 low-income seniors and people with disabilities in North Carolina. $^{\rm 4}$

...that Boost the North Carolina Economy

Medicaid and Medicare bring federal dollars into North Carolina and help create jobs:

- Medicaid brought the state of North Carolina over \$8.0 billion in federal dollars in 2012.⁵
- Medicare spending in North Carolina was over \$14.1 billion in 2009.⁶

Social Security and SSI benefits are typically spent in-state and help boost the North Carolina economy:

- Social Security paid over \$25.2 billion in benefits to North Carolinians in 2013, including over \$5.0 billion in Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits.⁴
- SSI paid over \$1.3 billion in federal benefits to North Carolinians in 2013.⁴
