



## Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and SSI are Lifelines for North Dakota Residents with Disabilities

## Lifelines for North Dakotans with Disabilities...

Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) are lifelines for North Dakotans with disabilities, including people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and their families:

Medicaid	•	North Dakota's Medicaid program enrolls over 85,000 people including over 12,000 non-elderly adults and children with disabilities. <sup>1</sup> Over 4,000 North Dakotans with I/DD receive Medicaid home and community-based (HCBS) services. <sup>2</sup>
Medicare	•	Medicare enrolls over 112,000 North Dakotans, including over 15,000 people with disabilities. $^{\rm 3}$
Social Security	•	Social Security serves over 122,000 North Dakotans, including over 16,000 Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) beneficiaries, along with their spouses and dependent children. <sup>4</sup>
SSI	•	SSI serves over 8,000 low-income seniors and people with disabilities in North Dakota. $^{\rm 4}$

## ...that Boost the North Dakota Economy

Medicaid and Medicare bring federal dollars into North Dakota and help create jobs:

- Medicaid brought the state of North Dakota over \$416.6 million in federal dollars in 2012.<sup>5</sup>
- Medicare spending in North Dakota was over \$850 million in 2009.<sup>6</sup>

**Social Security and SSI** benefits are typically spent in-state and help boost the North Dakota economy:

- Social Security paid over \$1.6 billion in benefits to North Dakotans in 2013, including over \$200 million in Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits.<sup>4</sup>
- SSI paid over \$40 million in federal benefits to North Dakotans in 2013.<sup>4</sup>
