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Join The Arc During Our National Convention



"People with autism have a lot to contribute in all aspects of our society. In the workplace, their individual unique talents need to be maximized to benefit both the goals of their employer, and their personal desire to have and keep a job that adds meaning to their life. Far too many people with autism are left on the sidelines of our workforce, and entities that have recognized the benefits of hiring someone with autism are reaping the rewards. Whether it's the loyalty that someone with a disability may bring to their employer, or their unique skill set that gets the job done, people with autism are ready for hire," said Peter Berns, CEO of The Arc.

The Arc is proud to announce the launch of an exciting new resource called TalentScout for employers to unlock the talents of people with autism in the workplace. One in 68 children is diagnosed with autism spectrum disorders (ASDs), and the unemployment rate of adults with disabilities, including ASDs, is 85%. That's an appallingly high number. With an increase in the prevalence of children being diagnosed with ASDs, it is more important than ever to ensure that people on the spectrum are able to find

gainful employment with fair wages, and that they are able to retain and be successful at their chosen careers.


With nearly 65 years of experience serving people I/DD including autism, The Arc is releasing TalentScout with the goal that it will give employers insight and tools to work with employees with autism. The kit will guide employers on how to ensure they understand what proper supports are needed and help them harness the full potential of employees on the spectrum. Its content is vetted by people with ASDs, and includes their first-hand accounts and insights as job applicants and employees. It is backed by the years of nationwide experience of The Arc's vast chapter network, and by Autism Now: National Autism Resource and Information Center.

TalentScout is also a valuable resource for government agencies working to implement the President's initiative (EO 13548) to hire 100,000 people with disabilities into the federal workforce, as well as federal contractors bringing their companies into compliance with the US Department of Labor Section 503 rules on employment of people with disabilities. It is only one component of TheArc@Work, which is leading the way in developing innovative workforce solutions for the government and private sector by connecting employers with talented employees with I/DD and supporting the recruitment, on-boarding, and retention process. Preserving our Lifeline – What You Can Do to Help

While Medicaid and Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) have so far largely been protected from deficit reduction efforts, there are looming threats.

Majorities in the House and Senate have voted for deep cuts to Medicaid and fundamental structural changes that would eliminate the entitlement to services and undo the system of supports and services for people with I/DD. Additionally, Congress must act by the end of 2016 to prevent a 20 percent across-the-board cut in SSDI benefits – but instead, on day one of the 114th Congress the House passed a rule creating hurdles to making the financial adjustment needed to prevent benefit cuts. And in both the House and Senate, Members have proposed bills to cut SSDI and create new barriers to work for SSDI beneficiaries.

We are in a fight to protect these essential lifelines for individuals with I/DD and their families. Now, more than ever

The Arc's Take on *Where Hope Grows*

In Theaters Now, Available Digitally and on DVD This Summer

A new film starring a young man named David DeSanctis is sweeping the nation in hundreds of theaters this month, and The Arc had a sneak peak opportunity to view this film and provide promotional support.

Where Hope Grows is a story of redemption through hope and love. It tells the story of Calvin, a former professional baseball player who has failed in the majors and lives in a perpetual quicksand of self-pity. This all begins to change when he meets and befriends a grocery store clerk with Down syndrome, known as "Produce." "Produce" inspires all those around him with a gentle spirit of perseverance, and the movie gives us a wonderful opportunity to share and celebrate the contributions that our family members, friends, co-workers, and others with I/DD bring to their communities.

The Arc strongly believes that people with I/DD should be getting more roles in feature films, and DeSanctis steals the show. His performance is impressive, and we are excited to see what's next for him as he progresses in the film industry!

Where Hope Grows follows the developing friendship between two people with very different backgrounds. Written and directed by Chris Dowling, one of the characters is a grocery store employee who has an intellectual/developmental disability (I/DD).

The Arc of the United States is delighted that Mr. Dowling and producers Steve Bagheri, Simran Singh, Jose Pablo Cantillo and Milan Chakraborty hired actor David DeSanctis, a young man with Down syndrome, to star in this film. The film's optimistic message is portrayed through Mr. DeSanctis' character who influences his community with a gentle power that progresses through the story. The Arc's Conversation Guide was developed to help viewers reflect on the film's story and to specifically discuss the portrayal of a person with Down syndrome shown as an independent person who is fully included in his community.

After viewing this film we encourage you to join with others to share your views and continue the conversation. *Where Hope Grows*, coming to 400-theaters in the U.S. in May 2015 gives us a wonderful opportunity to share and celebrate the contributions that our family members, friends, co-workers, fellow students and others with I/DD bring to their communities.

There are aspects of the film that provide the opportunity for further discussion, and so we have created a discussion guide to engage our chapters, members, and the general public in an honest dialogue about community inclusion and respect of people with I/DD. Visit our website, www.thearc.org/file/wherehopegrowsguide.pdf, to download the guide. For example, "Produce" is not referenced by any other name in the film — we find this unsettling and question why the other characters in the film have real names while "Produce" is only referred to by this nickname which can be seen as demeaning. We applaud many aspects of the film, particularly the portrayal of "Produce's" independence. The purpose of the discussion guide is to get the conversation started in your community, to educate those who watch the film and for open discussion.

Film is a powerful medium to connect with the general public, and educate about how people with I/DD should be included in the workplace, in community life, in their chosen faith, and in their relationships. There are aspects of the film that will undoubtedly help people understand and connect on an emotional level with our mission. And there are aspects of the film that disappoint — but therein lies the opportunity for discussion and understanding. Catching Some Waves with The Arc of the St. Johns

St. Augustine is an active coastal community in northeast Florida, and The Arc of the St. Johns has seen a void as many men, women and children with I/DD were missing the opportunity to enjoy the ocean and connect to a caring and sharing community of avid surfers. In response to the obvious need, and the urgings of Andy and his friends, The Arc created *Surf Quest*, a free monthly event with trained and enthusiastic volunteers who introduce adaptive aquatic recreation using specialized surfboards and flotation devices for anyone with a disability. The *Surf Quest* season opened in March 2015 and will culminate with the *Black Ties and Board Shorts Awards Banquet* in September.

Andy truly captured the hearts and attention of the entire crew of trained and experienced volunteer coaches, virtually all of whom had little or no experience or interaction with individuals with I/DD. "Andy's Crew" found the way to get Andy into the surf and onto a surfboard for a half-dozen rides. Jordan is his ride-along, and said, "Andy's courage and effusive enthusiasm touched all of us, and we feel the same way about every one of these

guys. We'll be here for every event."

Not wanting to leave the joy of the waves, Andy has gone back to his computer to edit videos of his most recent surf sessions, adding his favorite Beach Boys' songs as the soundtrack. He has also created his shopping list for new wardrobe essentials for the next

Surf Quest event: some cool Ray-Ban sunglasses, a pair of wild flower-print board shorts with a matching tank top, and a big, big, fluffy towel.


