

Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and SSI are Lifelines for Illinois Residents with Disabilities

Lifelines for Illinoisans with Disabilities...

Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) are lifelines for Illinoisans with disabilities, including people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and their families:

- Medicaid**
 - Illinois's Medicaid program enrolls over 2,927,000 people including over 333,000 non-elderly adults and children with disabilities.¹
 - Over 18,300 Illinoisans with I/DD receive Medicaid home and community-based (HCBS) services.²
- Medicare**
 - Medicare enrolls over 1,947,000 Illinoisans, including over 322,000 people with disabilities.³
- Social Security**
 - Social Security serves over 2,102,000 Illinoisans, including over 340,000 Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) beneficiaries, along with their spouses and dependent children.⁴
- SSI**
 - SSI serves over 277,000 low-income seniors and people with disabilities in Illinois.⁴

...that Boost the Illinois Economy

Medicaid and Medicare bring federal dollars into Illinois and help create jobs:

- Medicaid brought the state of Illinois over \$6.7 billion in federal dollars in 2012.⁵
- Medicare spending in Illinois was over \$19.1 billion in 2009.⁶

Social Security and SSI benefits are typically spent in-state and help boost the Illinois economy:

- Social Security paid over \$29.8 billion in benefits to Illinoisans in 2013, including over \$4.6 billion in Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits.⁴
- SSI paid over \$1.7 billion in federal benefits to Illinoisans in 2013.⁴
