

Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and SSI are Lifelines for Pennsylvania Residents with Disabilities

Lifelines for Pennsylvanians with Disabilities...

Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) are lifelines for Pennsylvanians with disabilities, including people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and their families:

- Medicaid**
 - Pennsylvania's Medicaid program enrolls over 2,531,000 people including over 640,000 non-elderly adults and children with disabilities.¹
 - Over 29,900 Pennsylvanians with I/DD receive Medicaid home and community-based (HCBS) services.²
- Medicare**
 - Medicare enrolls over 2,395,000 Pennsylvanians, including over 429,000 people with disabilities.³
- Social Security**
 - Social Security serves over 2,660,000 Pennsylvanians, including over 464,000 Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) beneficiaries, along with their spouses and dependent children.⁴
- SSI**
 - SSI serves over 376,000 low-income seniors and people with disabilities in Pennsylvania.⁴

...that Boost the Pennsylvania Economy

Medicaid and Medicare bring federal dollars into Pennsylvania and help create jobs:

- Medicaid brought the state of Pennsylvania over \$11.2 billion in federal dollars in 2012.⁵
- Medicare spending in Pennsylvania was over \$23.7 billion in 2009.⁶

Social Security and SSI benefits are typically spent in-state and help boost the Pennsylvania economy:

- Social Security paid over \$37.7 billion in benefits to Pennsylvanians in 2013, including over \$6.2 billion in Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits.⁴
- SSI paid over \$2.4 billion in federal benefits to Pennsylvanians in 2013.⁴
