



# Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and SSI are Lifelines for Wisconsin Residents with Disabilities

### Lifelines for Wisconsinites with Disabilities...

Medicaid, Medicare, Social Security, and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) are lifelines for Wisconsinites with disabilities, including people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and their families:

#### Medicaid

- Wisconsin's Medicaid program enrolls over 1,298,000 people including over 175,000 non-elderly adults and children with disabilities. 1
- Over 23,300 Wisconsinites with I/DD receive Medicaid home and community-based (HCBS) services.<sup>2</sup>

#### Medicare

Medicare enrolls over 967,000 Wisconsinites, including over 165,000 people with disabilities.<sup>3</sup>

### Social Security

 Social Security serves over 1,110,000 Wisconsinites, including over 183,000 Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) beneficiaries, along with their spouses and dependent children.<sup>4</sup>

SSI

 SSI serves over 114,000 low-income seniors and people with disabilities in Wisconsin.<sup>4</sup>

## ...that Boost the Wisconsin Economy

Medicaid and Medicare bring federal dollars into Wisconsin and help create jobs:

- Medicaid brought the state of Wisconsin over \$4.3 billion in federal dollars in 2012.
- Medicare spending in Wisconsin was over \$7.9 billion in 2009.<sup>6</sup>

**Social Security and SSI** benefits are typically spent in-state and help boost the Wisconsin economy:

- Social Security paid over \$15.6 billion in benefits to Wisconsinites in 2013, including over \$2.4 billion in Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits.<sup>4</sup>
- SSI paid over \$680 million in federal benefits to Wisconsinites in 2013.<sup>4</sup>
